The chief architect of the first ANZAC Day solemn service was actually an Anglican priest, Canon David John Garland, who pictured an "All Souls' Day for Australia" in 1916, to

commemorate the losses suffered at Gallipoli. His wish was for the service to be acceptable to all faiths and denominations or it would not be observed. I think ANZAC Day provides an opportunity for all of us to reflect on life and its meaning and its tragedies.

ANZAC Day, whilst in many ways a secular ceremony, has spiritual components that resonate for us as a Catholic school in the Edmund Rice tradition - be it in the sacrifice, in the lowering of the flag, the bugle call, the minute's silence something's calling us and as people of faith, we would believe that's God calls to us in these sacred moments.

NAPLAN Testing 2021 – Year 7 and Year 9

The National Assessment Program – Literacy and Numeracy (NAPLAN) tests for Year 7 and Year 9 students, will be held on Tuesday 11, Wednesday 12, and Thursday 13 May.

Please avoid making appointments for your son on these days.

Please note the following:

- NAPLAN testing for 2021 at Parade will be in the paper format.
- Year 7 and 9 students are required to bring a basic scientific calculator to the Numeracy test on Thursday 13 May. Please make sure your son has his calculator on that date.
- Classes will run as normal when students are not involved in NAPLAN testing.

On Wednesday 12 May, Year 9 Students are to attend, as per normal, the campus that they are timetabled to attend for ExCEL. After the completion of the NAPLAN, Year 9 students will be participating in the Morrisby Career analysis as part of their ExCEL class and then continue with ExCEL.

From the Assistant Principal - Student Wellbeing

Term 1 was our first full term back since the pandemic began and I know many students, parents and staff were exhausted at the end. I hope everyone had a relaxing break and took time to re-energise and recover from the busy start to 2021.

We wanted to take the time in this *Newsletter* to remind families and students of some expectations given the disrupted year that was 2020.

Please find below the expectations regarding uniform for the next two terms and also transport expectations.

Uniform

At Parade we value the tradition of wearing the College uniform well to honour all those men who have worn the purple, green and blue with pride and respect over the last 150 years

- Parade Blazer
- Grey Trousers or grey dress shorts with belt loops no elastic or drawstring waists
- Black Belt compulsory for Terms 2 and 3
- Grey Socks above the ankle no ankle or "tennis" socks
- Black, polishable, hard leather school shoes no street shoes or urban wear, – no black runners, either canvas or leather
- College Bag (Back Pack)
- White Shirt long-sleeved, buttoned to the collar, business collar
- Parade Tie for Years 7 to 10 / Senior Tie for Years 11 and 12.
- Leave all *jewellery* at home no earrings, pierced jewellery (including clear plastic studs), necklaces, rings, bracelets, friendship bands, sports bands, or other bands to be worn. If it is precious or important in any way to your son, it is safer at home, away from possible accidental damage or loss.
- Hair should be neat, clean and in a business-like style, eg; no dreadlocks, braids, mohawks, 'Dusty-cuts', etc.
- If your son is shaving, please make sure that he is cleanshaven for school <u>each and every day</u>.

College Bus Network

At Parade we value respect for, and cooperation with, those whose job it is to get us safely to and from school each day

- Students are not allowed to eat or drink on any of the buses to and from school - this is to assist the bus drivers to get to their next job on time, with a clean vehicle, or to help them complete their shifts on time at the end of the day, as well as ensuring a clean environment for all bus users;
- All young men are required to stay in their seats to and from school and wear the seat belts where these are provided as part of the students' responsibility for ensuring a safe trip for other passengers and the bus driver.
- Throwing any kind of material inside or outside the bus is a serious offence and will be treated as such. It is particularly distracting to bus drivers on very busy roads as well as disrespectful to the driver and fellow students.
- Noise levels should be kept to a reasonable level to allow bus drivers to concentrate on the task of getting students safely to their destinations.
- A MYKI card with appropriate funds is required for those students travelling on buses where a MYKI fare is required.
- Finally, cooperation with any directions given by bus drivers in the interests of passenger safety is always required from Parade students.

Public Transport

We expect all students to behave with courtesy and respect towards drivers and other passengers when using any form of public transport to and from school, and on excursions. We also expect students to stand and offer their seats to members of the public when using any form of public transport.

Reading at Parade

Reading the books to be studied in English for the remainder of 2021

We expect students to read their English books over the summer holidays, in preparation for the academic year ahead.

As each unit approaches, students are encouraged to re-read each book so that they are ready to fully participate in class. The remaining books for 2021 are:

Year 7

Finish reading 'Fog a Dox' by 12 July

Year 8

Finish reading 'Falling from Grace' by 26 July.

Year 9

Finish reading 'The Shiny Guys' by 16 August.

Year 10

Finish reading 'Maus' by 9 August.

Year 11

Finish reading "The Curious Incident of the Dog in the Nighttime' by 14 June.

Year 12

Finish reading 'Ransom' by 14 June.

Literature and Altior English teachers will communicate their expectations directly with their classes.

Wider Reading

The above books are a part of the formal English curriculum. Students are encouraged to engage in wider reading – that is, reading beyond these books – which will enable them to become better readers, better thinkers, and, ultimately, better people. Students should read for at least twenty minutes each afternoon/ night. Research conducted by Fisher, Frey and Hattie (2016) confirms that knowledge of vocabulary directly correlates to higher levels of achievement. In the below graphics, you can see how important reading is to your son's vocabulary development.

Additionally, a key finding in the recently published literature review '<u>The impact of reading for pleasure and empowerment</u>' is that reading for enjoyment not only boosts educational outcomes, but also enhances their emotional understanding. Reading increases empathy, enriches social relationships, reduces symptoms of depression and instils an overall sense of wellbeing.

Parade encourages reading by running the Parade Reading Challenge, the Word Millionaire and participating in the Premiers' Reading Challenge. Students can earn House points, certificates and badges for participation.

Wider reading: accessing books, e-Books, audiobooks, and e-Magazines

All students have access to a range of resources to support their reading. At the NLC and CCLC, students are able to borrow hard copy fiction and non-fiction books.

Additionally, we have a range of digital resources available. E -Books are available on MyOn, SORA, and Wheelers; audiobooks on BorrowBox and Wheelers; e-Magazines on RB Digital. To access these digital resources, students should locate the Learning Centres subheading under School Links on SIMON.

Finally, if you assist your son in joining the local library (such as Darebin Libraries, Yarra Plenty Regional Libraries, and Moreland Libraries), he will be able to access an even wider range of reading materials.

What you can do to help at home

The Harvard Graduate School of Education offers the follow advice for parents trying to develop their son's reading skills:

- Read in front of your son. We know that all children learn from what they observe. If you're visibly engaged in and excited about reading, your son is likely to catch your enthusiasm and become a better reader himself.
- Talk to your son about what you are reading. It is key to show your son that you enjoy reading and think that learning is important. In turn, ask your son about what he is reading and studying in English. To assist with this, you may like to read the book your son is studying in class, so that you can more deeply engage him in conversations about it.
- Visit the library together and borrow books for yourself as well as for your son.
- Scatter books, magazines, newspapers, and comics in everyday places — the car, bedroom, or the breakfast table.
- View websites together with your son, share e-Books, even listen to audiobooks. This all counts as reading every little bit helps!
- Have conversations with your son about current events and happenings in your community.

The materials for these projects will be sourced from the Darebin Recovery Centre which sells donated items destined for landfill. The Recovery Centre provides employment for citizens who have experienced difficulty in obtaining work.

ACC Swimming Championships 2021

From The Old Paradians

Joe calls time at Arsenal

Joe Montemurro, a final year student of Parade's Class of 1987, is to stand down as Arsenal Women's Manager at season's end.

Joe has held the position since November 2017, during which time he guided the Gunners to the 2018-19 Women's Super League title as well as the League Cup in 2018.

In a statement released by the club, it was reported that Joe, whose side currently sits fourth on the WSL table, had "decided to take a professional break to recharge and dedicate more time to spending with his family".

The 51-year-old boy from Fairfield, a well-liked and respected figure throughout the sport, said he had made the decision in February – "the hardest professional decision of my life, as I absolutely love this job and this club, the club I have supported all my life".

"Probably just after the return this season there were some things I needed to resolve and look at, but the decision happened in February and we decided that this was the best time to announce it going forward," Joe later told reporters.

"The biggest thing I was scared of when I told Vinai (Venkatesham, chief executive) and Clare (Wheatley, development manager) was that they'd be upset and never let me back into the club, but they've been absolutely amazing.

"I can sit here and safely say that I will be forever part of the Arsenal family and I was one of the lucky ones that got to work here and give my all and meet some amazing people."

For the past nine years, Joe has remained in continuous management with Melbourne City, during which time he's had to split time with his family, some of whom remained in Australia during his tenure with the Gunners.

Joe's plans beyond Arsenal are unknown at the time of writing.

1963 - When Paradians First Played The World Game

It's almost 60 years since members of Parade's pioneering Soccer XI first took to the pitch. That happened in 1963, Kennedy was still in the White House, and the moment was recorded for posterity in *The Paradian*.

SOCCER AT PARADE

This is news. For the first time in history, Parade fielded soccer teams — two of them. For the first time ever, we soccered against another team — our old friends, "North". First games, our Firsts were beaten; our Seconds won. Second games (Big return feature), our Firsts won, and our Seconds lost. We enjoyed ourselves, and thank the Brothers for giving us the sport and the games.

"The Paradian" wishes to record our Firsts — it's historic! A. Chiodo (Capt.), B. Chamula, J. Chiera, D. Coghlan, A. Comito, G. Coppi, H. Gieleswki, S. Gnatiw, P. Hermans, A. Marianni, P. Paradiso, A. Rossi, C. Rutten, P. Trainor, L. Pezzimenti.

Joseph Chiera, a member of that famed 15-man soccer squad, recently recalled the first of just a handful of games involving the boys of Parade and those of St Joseph's North Melbourne – some of them near the old Fairlea Women's Prison in Fairfield, others in a locale that escapes his memory somewhere in North Melbourne town.

"I'm scratching my head a little to remember, as I'm 76 and the boys in that team first came together almost 60 years ago," said Joe, who is pictured with John Pedrotti pouring



over a copy of the '63 edition of *The Paradian* at their final year class's 50-year reunion dinner back in 2013.

"I do remember that we basically formed the team ourselves, if memory serves with the support of Br. Robinson - or 'Robbo' as we called him, The tournament was never really official and maybe a few Brothers rang around and arranged for us to play. But I got my driver's licence when I turned 18 in June 1963, the year I completed Year 12 and I remember that when we played in North Melbourne the whole team piled into the family car – a Holden FB station wagon, sky blue with a white roof - and I drove them all to the ground."

A native of Girifalco in the Calabrian region of southern Italy where his parents were also born, Joe was but a boy of ten when he joined his mother, brother and sister on the voyage of a lifetime - traversing the globe aboard the passenger ship *Neptunia* to be reunited with his father who had migrated some four years previous.

Not long after walking down the gangway, Joe forged friendships with Anthony Chiodo and Anthony Comito, both with whom Joe would one day chase the round ball in those precious soccer contests for the College.

"Tony Chiodo, Tony Comito and I were great friends from day one. They were in Australia for about 18 months before me," Joe said.

"When we arrived in the mid-1950s we were the 'dagos', which didn't really matter because we lived in Collingwood and there was more of us than them! "The two Tonys and myself all lived within 100 metres of each other, just off Johnston Street Collingwood between Wellington and Hoddle Streets. We all went to St Joseph's Primary School in Wellington Street and they were very good with English compared to me - I didn't know a word so the nuns at St Joseph's sat me next to Tony Comito, he became my translator and he's been my solicitor ever since he qualified."

Joe confirmed that until that pivotal moment in '63 "there was no soccer at Parade - and I can also tell you that there was no Italian taught at Parade, which is why myself and a few others ended up learning Italian at Melbourne University High School".

"We were encouraged by a Mr. Gregor, one of our lay teachers at the time, to learn at Uni High in a course run by Co.As.It.," Joe said, "and if you go to the 1964 edition of *The Paradian* you will see that a number of us got First Class Honours in Italian, which helped get us into 'uni'...".

In pouring over the names of his fellow pioneering soccer players, Joe was able to confirm that the team's captain Anthony Chiodo had since died, as had Paul Paradiso who was godfather to one of his daughters.

But the retired pharmacist confirmed that he still bumped into old teammates like Anthony Comito, Doug Coghlan, Giusto Coppi, Anthony Mariani and Adrian Rossi – and to this day he compares notes with Leon Pezzimenti at Dante Alighieri Society gatherings in Carlton.



Soccer still took a long time to gain a foothold at Parade, even after Joe Chiera and his fellow trailblazers first took to the field in '63. Not until the Carlton Premiership year of 1970 was the first College soccer team (coached by the then Principal Br Greening) actually photographed for posterity for *The Paradian* (see below).

Team members featured in that pic at the Bundoora Campus include the late Frank Gonano (middle row, far left), the former North Melbourne restaurateur Dom Torre (for years the proprietor of Don Camillo's Restaurant in West Melbourne, front row, far left) and Ken Scott (later a College teacher, front row, second from the right). Together they earned six victories and twice lost through the course of the '70 season.

Today, the Bundoora Campus boasts two outstanding soccer pitches for the use of its students – and Joe harbors the great hope that an Old Paradians soccer team might one day take to the field.

"I'm surprised that a team doesn't already exist," said Joe, who also shared the accompanying photograph of him balancing a giant mushroom by the legendary old FB at the then family home at 44 Sheila Street East Preston.

"Back then soccer was a no-no, but the game for a number of years now is more widely played than AFL."

Old Paradian Declared Deloitte's Next CEO

The board of Deloitte Australia has settled on Adam Powick, a final-year Parade College student of 1983, as its preferred candidate to replace Richard Deutsch in the role of CEO.

The *Financial Review's* Professional Services Editor Edmund Tadros recently reported that the board's decision came after Mr Deutsch surprised the firm and its leaders by suddenly resigning as chief executive on March 11.

At Deloitte Australia, the board selects a preferred CEO candidate from a shortlist and then recommends that person to the partnership. The partners then vote yes or no to the candidate, with the recommended candidate typically receiving a high level of support.

The *Financial Review* reported that Asia Pacific CEO Cindy Hook played a key kingmaker role in Adam's selection as the board's preferred candidate.



The board, led by chairman Tom Imbesi, told the partnership about Adam's selection as preferred candidate, with a vote expected before the end of the month.

Adam, who has a bachelor of aeronautical engineering from RMIT University and an MBA from Monash University, has worked at Deloitte for more than 25 years. He has been the firm's Asia-Pacific consulting leader since 2018, a role that oversees an advisory business spanning China, Japan, Australia, India, Singapore, Malaysia, Indonesia, Thailand, New Zealand and Korea.

Melbourne-based Adam was previously Deloitte Australia's managing partner of clients and industries between 2015 and 2018, and the managing partner of consulting between 2010 and 2015.

Adam began his professional career as a systems engineer at Fujitsu Australia before moving to Deloitte as a consultant in 1992. He describes the move to the firm as being a "youngster stepping out and learning the management consulting game" in his LinkedIn profile. He was made a Deloitte Australia partner in 2002.

Adam completed his final year at Parade in the same year as Principal Andy Kuppe. His younger brother Greg was a final year student of Parade in 1984, and represented the Old Paradians' Football Club in its B-Section Premiership team of 1986. His uncle the Old Paradian Raymund Cashmore completed his schooling at the 'Old Bluestone Pile' in 1966.
