



From the Principal

Welcome back to all our students for second term. We hope that all families enjoyed a happy Easter and that students have had a refreshing term break. We finished last term with a special Easter Liturgy House groups. As a church, we continue to celebrate the feast or Easter over the next few weeks.

Last week we celebrated ANZAC Day with a ritual in Tutor Group. We also welcome back today the class of 1972 and Parade Veterans for a luncheon ahead of the 1st XI Football and 1st XVIII AFL games. We also celebrate the Bedford Madden Shield – the annual 1st XVIII AFL game between St Bernard's and Parade College. Old Boy, Lieutenant Colonel David Millie, MBE (Ret.) is the guest speaker.

David Millie graduated from the Royal Military College, Duntroon in 1959 and served in infantry, aviation and training units prior to service in Vietnam with the Australian Army Training Team Vietnam in 1968-1969. For much of this time he was allocated for duty with U.S. Army Advisory Team 19 in Quang Tri province, the northernmost province of South Vietnam.

As Parade College celebrates 151 years, we remember that Old Paradians fought and died in each major campaign and there are many Old Paradians serving in Australia's armed forces today. We remember in a particular way those that served in the 1st and 2nd World War and the Vietnam Wars in No. 7 4 May 2022



the Honour Boards in the Hickey Foyer. The chief architect of the first ANZAC Day solemn service was actually an Anglican priest, Canon David John Garland, who pictured an *"All Souls' Day for Australia"* in 1916, to commemorate the losses suffered at Gallipoli. His wish was for the service to be acceptable to all faiths and denominations or it would not be observed. I think observing ANZAC Day provides an opportunity for all of us to reflect on life and its meaning and its tragedies.

ANZAC Day, whilst in many ways a secular ceremony, has spiritual components that resonate for us as a Catholic school in the Edmund Rice tradition - be it in the sacrifice, in the lowering of the flag, the bugle call, the minute's silence something's calling us and as people of faith, we would believe that's God calls to us in these sacred moments.

From the Assistant Principal - Student Wellbeing

Welcome back to Term 2. Term 1 was a long term, especially given it was our first full term back in two years. We look forward to settling in again and assisting students and families as we continue onsite.

Early Departure or Late Arrival

Over the course of this term we will be moving to absences, late arrivals and early departures being recorded by families through PAM. By the end of the term there will be no absence phone line and students signing in late or out early will need to have had this recorded on PAM in advance. This will ensure our records are accurate.

We communicated last term about the process for all day absences. If your son is leaving early or arriving late this will need to be recorded on PAM also. Early departures and late arrivals can be found in the same place all day absences are recorded (see below).



Once you click on the above icon you will click early departure or late arrival (rather than all day absence) and this will automatically alert your sons teacher and Student services.

There is no need to provide a handwritten note. Your son will simply head to Student Services to officially sign out.

Year 9 Man Cave

Over the coming week our Year 9 students will participate in their second day of the Man Cave program. 'The Man Cave' is a preventative mental health and emotional intelligence organisation for boys and young men.

Year 9 students will only participate on either Thursday 5 May or Monday 9 May. This has been communicated to families via email.

Through one of the full day workshops, which Year 9s at both Bundoora and Preston will attend at their home campus, students will participate in building respectful relationships across all domains of their life.

This section explores how to support others, empathy, conflict resolution, expressing needs, power/privilege and integrity. In this workshop, boys will:

- Explore what defines a respectful relationship, especially with women
- Consider the quality of their own relationships
- Take responsibility for the impact of their words or actions on other
- Learn to empathise with each other's personal stories
- Learn to manage and resolve conflict without violence
- Improve the quality of their relationships with each other

All details of the program have been communicated to students and families of Year 9. We ask that in advance our families have conversations with young men about the issues they are facing and after the workshops debrief with them about what they learnt and their experience. This ensures we are all working in partnership to support our young men.

Nano Nagle VCE Tutoring Program

It has been great to see the initial numbers attending the Nano Nagle Tutoring sessions, but there is still room for more students to attend.

The program runs every Monday to Thursday in MQ28 (VCE Study Centre) from 3.30pm to 5.30pm. Students can attend for part, or whole, of the session and can receive free assistance from recent high scoring Old Paradians (Class of 21) or may just choose to simply complete their homework in a collaborative group of their friends.

No bookings are necessary, students simply report to the VCE Study Centre at 3.30pm and sign in. Students are able to leave at any time throughout the session.

General Achievement Test (GAT)

The VCAA has changed the structure of the GAT for 2022 and it will now be completed by any student completing a VCE Unit 3 and Unit 4 study throughout the year, as well as all Senior VCAL students.

The General Achievement Test will be held on Wednesday 7 September commencing at 9.30am. More details will be available for the students closer to the date.

There is no need to prepare for this assessment, however the College will familiarise the students with the style of questions and provide strategies to assist the boys in the lead up to this date.

Year 11 Exams

Friday 3 June to Tuesday 14 June Year 11 students will have exams in all subjects In the event that a student fails to attend a Year 8 to Year 11 examination, if possible, it will be rescheduled only for approved school events (eg; ACC Sport) or upon presentation of a medical certificate.

All students are required to be wear their correct full school uniform in all exams. Sport uniform may not be worn except by those involved in ACC sport on the day of the exam.

Year 10 and Year 11 students are required to attend school for the times of their exams plus 30 minutes prior. There will be no expectation to attend Tutor Group on these days.

Study halls will be available for study to any students remaining at school during normal school hours.

Normal classes run for Year 8 ands Year 9 students when not in exams.

Epipens and Excursions

In order for a student to attend an excursion or event off the premises they must carry their individual College Epipen and their spare Epipen from home with them in order to attend that event. This is to ensure that sufficient medications are available should the student require them.

Anaphylaxis - Expired Epipens for March and April

There are a number of anaphylactic students that have Epipens that expired at the end of March and April.

Parents of students that are at risk of anaphylaxis should be aware that, in response to Ministerial Order 706, it is a requirement of legislation that students who attend the College must have supplied the College with a valid Epipen and a current Anaphylaxis Action Plan for their personal use.

This is now a matter of urgency.

It would be greatly appreciated if parents/carers updated their son's expired Epipen and Anaphylaxis Action Plan as quickly as possible.

Epipens and Action Plans need to be dropped at College Reception at both campuses.

Parade College Aboriginal Ties and Scarves

We are very proud to be able to offer the sale of the College Aboriginal Ties and Scarves to our College community.

Designed by Aboriginal Parade students in 2019 and approved with consultation by Wurundjeri Elder Auntie Di Kerr, they tell the Aboriginal story of the Parade College grounds, as told by Wurundjeri Elder Uncle Dave Wandin.

The circles represent the people who lived, cared for, farmed, hunted and travelled on this Country. Aboriginal people lived and met on this Country daily to hunt and sit under the big Red Gums they planted. They exchanged information about land management, what they saw on their daily walks, observed, ate and shared food, weaved and traded.

You can see the kangaroo tracks down the tie, representing the Kangaroos that lived on this land to feed and rest. The Aboriginal meaning of Bundoora is thought to mean where the kangaroos lived.

In the last week of Term 1 The Cage event took place for the first time in three years. The site, which was set up In Alphington Court on Wednesday 6 and Thursday 7 April, consisting of barb wire topped fencing, corralling participants into a corner of the area.

Those involved slept on the ground and went without a shower to give some sense of the deprivation experienced by true refugees. There were a few activities and several classes visited those confined to the cage over the Wednesday afternoon and Thursday morning.

Thanks are extended to Mr Shaun Spiteri who spent considerable time and effort organising and facilitating the event. Thanks are also due to Ms Morello who supervised the students.

After hearing first-hand recounts of refugees, it really was a different experience, and it is really something that to this day sticks with me. More on this we were so lucky to hear from Hakeem al-Araibi, a famous refugee who plays football.

Hakeem was arrested in Thailand on his honeymoon and he talked about how for months he was stuck in a small room with about twenty to thirty other criminals. It was with the help of Craig Foster, whom we were also lucky enough to speak to, that he was finally able to get out and return to Australia.

Just hearing all these stories made me realise how lucky we are to be living in Australia. You know, we were in a cage for 24 hours and it wasn't the best - the experience was quite uncomfortable - but compared to what others, including Hakeem, went through we could not complain.

For those who are considering doing The Cage next year. I highly recommend it.

Reading at Parade

It is crucial that students develop a home reading routine. The following article, which offers suggestions to parents who want to encourage reading at home, is adapted from the Ontario Ministry of Education's *Me Read? No Way!* resource.

Parental involvement 101

Please consider the following valuable tips for families who want to encourage their boys to read:

Take it easy

Becoming a reader has little to do with reading difficult books and everything to do with the amount of reading a boy does. So let your boy choose books, even if they are below his reading level.

If your son chooses books that are very easy, he may be feeling unsure of his abilities, and is looking for some reassurance. This, too, is perfectly normal. What you don't want to happen is for him to give up on reading altogether for any amount of time.

Let him choose

As much as possible, let your son choose the books he wants to read for pleasure, and fight the impression that reading is a chore that is imposed on him.

He might choose the same types of books over and over again. He might choose books that are gross, or humour that is edgy. This, too, is perfectly normal.

Try to remember that he is exposed to these types of things in the media all the time, and that he can deal with such things better in the context of a book.

Read with him

Reading is hard for many boys, but stories are still appealing. Share the reading, so he only has to do half the work. If the reading is too hard but the story is too good, just read it to him. Listening to things being read encourages boys to read well.

Men, especially, have been trained to read in isolation. Break the cycle! Read in front of boys, yours or anyone else's.

Show respect for mental activities

Reading is just part of a rich life of the mind. Show the same respect for that world as you do for the physical world.

Involve yourself and your son in library and school activities, chess and other challenging mental games, crossword puzzles and the like.

The mind needs to be exercised, just like muscles.

The Morrisby Test uses a combination of psychometric assessments and questionnaires to give students an idea of where their strengths and preferences lie.

After analysing students results, the test offers impartial recommendations for careers and subjects that match students' abilities and interests.
