


Our team of three students competed on the day against four other schools, with each team cooking a main course and a dessert using this years competition criteria of including five seasonal ingredients.

### School Photos

National Photography have advised that they are in the final stages of preparing and printing the College photos. Like most businesses, National have been impacted by staff absences this year which has meant a longer than expected print run. Thank you to families for their patience.

### Morning Drop Off

Parents and carers are reminded to ensure they drop their sons in the designated areas in the morning, rather than driving to the staff carpark or into College Square. This is to ensure a smooth flow of traffic and to make morning drop off safer for staff and students.

### Flu Season and COVID-19 Vaccination

With borders opening and the arrival of colder weather, cases of influenza (the flu) are increasing throughout Victoria. Our community is at risk of higher rates of students and staff affected by the flu or COVID-19 this season.

### What to do if your child gets sick

To help keep your child and our school community safe, please take the following steps if your child has any cold or flu like symptoms:

- take a COVID-19 test and follow the current [Department of Health isolation requirements](#) if a positive result is shown
- keep your child at home until their symptoms pass
- common flu-like symptoms include a high fever, cough, runny nose, loss of appetite, body aches and feeling extremely weak and tired
- diagnosis of the flu can only be confirmed by a doctor after a nose or throat swab
- encourage your child to wash their hands regularly and ask them to cover their nose and mouth when sneezing and coughing.

### COVID-19 Vaccination

COVID-19 vaccines are available free of charge to everyone aged 5 years and over in Australia.

It is important that children and young people have the best possible protection against the flu and COVID-19 by getting vaccinated. Ensuring your children are protected against serious illness helps to protect everyone in our community, including older family members who may be at higher risk, along with younger children who can't receive vaccinations yet.

You can book COVID-19 vaccinations through the COVID-19 hotline on 1800 675 398 or at a participating GP, pharmacy, or community health service.

Some local schools are also holding walk-in COVID-19 vaccination clinics on school grounds. Vaccination settings can be found at the [Vaccine Clinic Finder](#).

### Flu Vaccination

Flu vaccination is recommended for everyone aged 6 months and over.

Some people are more at risk of complications from the flu and are eligible for free vaccination under the [National Immunisation Program](#) including:

- anyone aged 65 years and older
- pregnant women (at any stage of [pregnancy](#))
- all Aboriginal and Torres Strait Islander people aged from 6 months and over
- people 6 months or older with:
  - [heart disease](#)
  - [chronic lung disease](#) (including people with severe [asthma](#) who require frequent hospital visits)
    - chronic neurological conditions
    - impaired immunity
    - haemoglobinopathies (blood disorders caused by genetic changes)
  - [diabetes](#)
  - [kidney disease](#)
- children on long-term aspirin therapy from 6 months to 10 years
- children aged from 6 months to under 5 years.

## From the Assistant Principal - Teaching & Learning

### Morrisby Online Career Assessment

Year 9 students have completed the Morrisby Online Career Assessment. This assessment provides valuable information which will inform subject selection, future careers and pathways planning for students. The report also be available on SIMON/PAM in 'Assessment Tasks' at the start of Term 3.

### Semester 1 Examinations, Years 8 to 11

#### Year 8 Exams

Monday 30 May to Friday 3 June during periods 3 and 4.  
Normal classes run for Year 8 students when not in exams.

#### Year 9 Exams

Tuesday 31 May, Thursday 2 June and Friday 3 June during periods 1 and 2, and periods 5 and 6.

Normal classes run for Year 9 students when not in exams.

Wednesday 1 June is a normal ExCEL day for Year 9 students, at the usual ExCEL locations, and full attendance is expected.

#### Year 10 Exams

Monday 6 June to Tuesday 14 June  
Year 10 students will have exams in all subjects

#### Year 11 Exams

Friday 3 June to Tuesday 14 June  
Year 11 students will have exams in all subjects

If a student is unable to attend an examination, it may not be possible to have the exam rescheduled. Where a student misses an exam due to illness, then they will receive the grade 'X-Special Circumstance' for that task. Students absent for an exam due to an approved school event (eg; ACC Sport) will be notified of an alternative time to sit the examination that was missed.

All students are required to be wear their correct full school uniform in all exams. Sport uniform may not be worn except by those involved in ACC sport on the day of the exam.

Year 10 and Year 11 students are required to attend school for the times of their exams plus thirty minutes prior. There will be no expectation to attend Tutor Group on these days. Study halls will be available for study to any students remaining at school during normal school hours.

Year 11 students who are accelerating in a Unit 3 / 4 subject are expected to attend all classes during the examination period except if they have an exam on at the same time. In the case of a Unit 3 / 4 subject having a SAC at the same time as a Year 11 examination, the SAC will take preference and the exam will be rescheduled to an appropriate time.

Monday 13 June is the day of the Queen's Birthday Public Holiday.

### Semester 2 Timetables

Student timetables are built around maximising student's elective choices. At the end of the semester when students change their electives, many boys will also have a change of teacher for some of their year-long subjects in Semester 2. As students' programs become more elective-based, they understand that these changes become more necessary to accommodate their elective selections.

As such, except for compelling cases, students in Years 7 to Year 10 are not able to make changes to their elective subjects.

Finding a subject no longer enjoyable or discovering it to be more challenging than expected are not considered compelling reasons for making changes to elective subjects. In such situations, it is preferable that students and their parents work with their son's teacher to support them through their learning.

Staff from Banyule Council Service will be visiting the Bundoora Campus on Wednesday 13 July to immunise Year 10 students.

Immunisation is an important and effective tool for protecting your child, their peers, and the wider community from serious disease. All secondary school vaccines are funded by the Government until your child turns twenty years of age.

Your son will soon receive from their Tutor Teacher an immunisation consent card to be signed by a parent/carer if you wish to have your son immunised.

*If your son is not having the immunisation, the consent card still needs to be ticked 'no' and returned to his Tutor Teacher.*

## Parade College Aboriginal Ties and Scarves

We are very proud to be able to offer the sale of the College Aboriginal Ties and Scarves to our College community.

Designed by Aboriginal Parade students in 2019 and approved with consultation by Wurundjeri Elder Auntie Di Kerr, they tell the Aboriginal story of the Parade College grounds, as told by Wurundjeri Elder Uncle Dave Wandin.


The circles represent the people who lived, cared for, farmed, hunted and travelled on this Country. Aboriginal people lived and met on this Country daily to hunt and sit under the big Red Gums they planted. They exchanged information about land management, what they saw on their daily walks, observed, ate and shared food, weaved and traded.

You can see the kangaroo tracks down the tie, representing the Kangaroos that lived on this land to feed and rest. The Aboriginal meaning of Bundoora is thought to mean where the kangaroos lived.

## From the Assistant Principal - Student Wellbeing

On Thursday 19 May our Year 11 students at Bundoora engaged in a full day seminar run by Dave Kobler from Your Choiceez. The Your Choiceez seminar is an important part of the development of our young men at Parade. It was originally scheduled for 2021 but due to circumstances was rescheduled for this year.



Through presentations, groups discussions and break out reflection sessions the seminar covered the topics of Relationships, Sexual Decision Making, Pornography, Consent + Sexual Ethics, Identity + Pressures, Love.

At the end of the day students were able to:

- Describe the key ingredients within a healthy relationship and be aware of what to look for in an unhealthy one.
- Consider their online choices.
- Understand the impact pornography can have personally + relationally.
- Have a thorough understanding of consent and what it means within relationship.
- Be empowered to make decisions that are right for them despite pressure they may face from peers.
- Understand how to connect in a meaningful way with family and friends.

## Your Choiceez Seminar

On Thursday 19 May, the Year 11 students were treated to Your Choiceez Seminar conducted by David Kobler. The seminar accentuated the detrimental effects that pornography imposes upon male self-esteem, chemical imbalances in the brain and male perception of women. We were also educated on strategies to combat pornography addiction.

In addition to this, David Kobler provided significant and personal life experiences applicable to human relationships and the types of relationships we should form, and how to be acknowledged as respectful men in society. To increase our understanding of these concepts, David exemplified the dichotomies between two men and how their lives differed due to their choices in the relationships they formed.

We were also educated about choices in relation to sexual consent and adhering to the law and avoiding offences such as sexual harassment.

We were also able to share how we can proactively speak out in situations and how we call each other out if needed. Students were able to express their thoughts and curiosities in a respectful environment.

## The OPA Gala - 150 Years in the making

### The Old Paradians' Association Celebration of Parade College's 150 Years (1871-2021)

A wonderful evening of celebration was had at the Park Hyatt Grand Ballroom on Friday 1 April to celebrate the College's 150 years. Originally planned for October 2021, we finally got the event to the line to fittingly celebrate.

Close to 400 were in attendance ranging from Old Paradians from the 1950's through to 2020. Fourteen past College Captains were scattered around the room from Dennis Green (1958) to Michael Donato (2017). The venue set up around forty tables of Old Paradians and guests to enjoy an evening of connection, reminisces and celebration of our College.



We were blessed and most fortunate to have the services of Daniel Harford (1994), *pictured above*, who so generously gave of his time and talent to MC the event. A professional and entertaining effort right down to leading a rousing rendition of the College's famed 'War Cry' to conclude the evening's formalities.



The College's first lay Principal in that 150 years, Andy Kuppe (1983), spoke passionately of its history and contribution to Catholic Education in Victoria in his address.

He followed with the launch of the Parade College Foundation and the history of the many Old Paradians and Catholic community over the 150 years that contributed so generously to the College's establishment and development from the East Melbourne days, the purchase of Parade College Alphington site, the establishment and development of the Bundoora campus through to the College's Preston campus.

Andy was able to recognise the contributions of Foundation subcommittee members, Old Paradian Andy Walsh (1971), John Dinan (1977), financial adviser Dino Rebellato (1978), and College Alumni Officer and OPA CEO Tony De Bolfo (1980) for their efforts in bringing the Foundation to a reality.

Andy was also able to launch Tony De Bolfo's book *Parade Thy Sons Volume 2* at the celebration. Andy was able to acknowledge the wonderful skills and gifts that Tony has in the story telling of several Old Paradians spanning from 1963 to the present day.

He also acknowledged the work of editor John Ramsdale (1966) who unveiled a framed portrait of the front covers of both Volumes of the book. Andy was able to reflect that "each story tells the Parade story, but no one story tells the Parade story" Andy was also able to recognise those who had the honour of being in the book and Volume 1 who were in the room that night.



Old Paradians Association President Dr Paul Shannon (1985), *pictured above*, was able to welcome all present in the room, including three of the four living Parade College Principals, Principals Brother Laurie Collins (1983-1988) and Br Brian Bond (1989-1994), and of course current Principal Andy Kuppe. Paul welcomed the College's first female student Elnaz Tavancheh (2014). Paul was also able to acknowledge and thank the College Development Team for putting the occasion together.

We were blessed to have Father Joe Caddy VG AM, Vicar General Catholic Archdiocese Melbourne (1977), who was able to say Grace

A highlight of the evening was the induction of our latest Hall of Fame recipients. Each was presented on stage to a standing ovation. Significantly Michael Pratt (1972), Hall of Fame recipient in 2011, assisted Daniel Harford with the presentations.

Peter 'Wheels' Bedford (1964) was the first Hall of Fame recipient presented. Originally to be inducted in 2021, but postponed because of COVID, Peter, an outstanding

sportsman in both Football and Cricket, emotionally accepted the honour. Peter is a proud Old Paradian and acknowledged the tremendous influence the school had on his life.

Terry Moran AM AO (1966), *pictured below*, was next inducted to the Old Paradians Hall of Fame. Terry was College Captain (Head Prefect) in his final year and went on to an outstanding career in public service administration and leadership rising to become the most senior public servant in the country. Terry spoke of the powerful influences the College provided laying foundations for his personal and professional life. His reflections on the Rudd Gillard years as Head of the Department of PM and Cabinet were illuminating as were some exchanges that took place with his political bosses.



Michael Drapac (1973) was the next recipient of the Old Paradians Association's coveted Hall of Fame. Michael was able to reflect upon the positive impact the College had on him and the sacrifices his mother made to educate him and his two brothers. Daniel Harford was able to get Michael to



It can be confronting here and at times overwhelming, however I set them up with a very planned activity in a quieter area, and they were eager to assist the residents and engage in conversations with them that were mostly gibberish, yet sat and looked the residents in the eyes and did their best in such a dignified manner. I was really impressed with how they handled it. Fine young men.*

William Thomson writes of his experience:

*I really enjoyed volunteering at the aged care, it was nice to hear all their story's they told us. The people that work there are lovely, and they were all very passionate about helping the elderly out. I really enjoyed volunteering there and happy I chose to do it.*

Charlie Wilson (L08), Anthony Scarfo-Pasinetti (B02) and Jack Farrugia (B04) have been visiting Bethel Aged Care and engaging with their residents. Charlie writes:






